ROCKWOOD TO THE FRONT

School District Will Probably Erect New Building and the Progressive Grange Wants the Present School Building.

Rockwood grange held a rousing meeting last Saturday and took preliminary steps toward securing its own home. The Rockwood school district has awakened to the fact that it needs a larger school building and is proposing the sale of the present structure in order that it may have a new schoolhouse of greater capacity. It is proposed to erect a four-room building provided the taxpayers of the district so decide, and if the old building can be sold the proceeds will go toward the new one.

Rockwood grange took the matter up of buying the present building and converting it into a grange hall. The building is only four years old and is well built. Without any remodeling it would make an ideal lodge room, but would have to be moved to a new site. At the meeting held last Saturday the necessary ground was offered at a low cost and money for the purchase was promised by one of the members for a long time at a reasonable rate of interest. The grange now has about \$125 in its funds, which would pay for moving and furnishing and if the school district finally decides to sell, there is nothing to prevent the grange from making the investment.

A committee to take the matter in charge was appointed consisting of J. H. Richmond, O. J. Brown, F. H. Crane, Mrs. V. A. Lovelace and E. L. Thorpe.

The lecturer, Mrs. Ida M. Thorpe, has organized a new feature in her department. She will establish a "Magazine Library" free to all the people of the neighborhood. All members having magazines will give them to the library and they can be drawn out twice a month, at grange meetings, upon payment of ten cents per quarter. Those having charge of the library organization are Mrs. Thorpe, Mrs. Kettering and Miss Ellen Taylor. Contributions of magazines are solicited from any source. The grange has also decided to compile and have printed a new cook book for general sale. This work was placed in charge of Mrs. Geo. Stockton, Mrs. Laura Pullen and Mrs. Thorpe.

The Grange Contest announced in last week's Herald to be held at Evening Star grange will be on Saturday, February 23d, and will begin in the morning, lasting during the day.

C. H. Foster Will Lecture Here.
