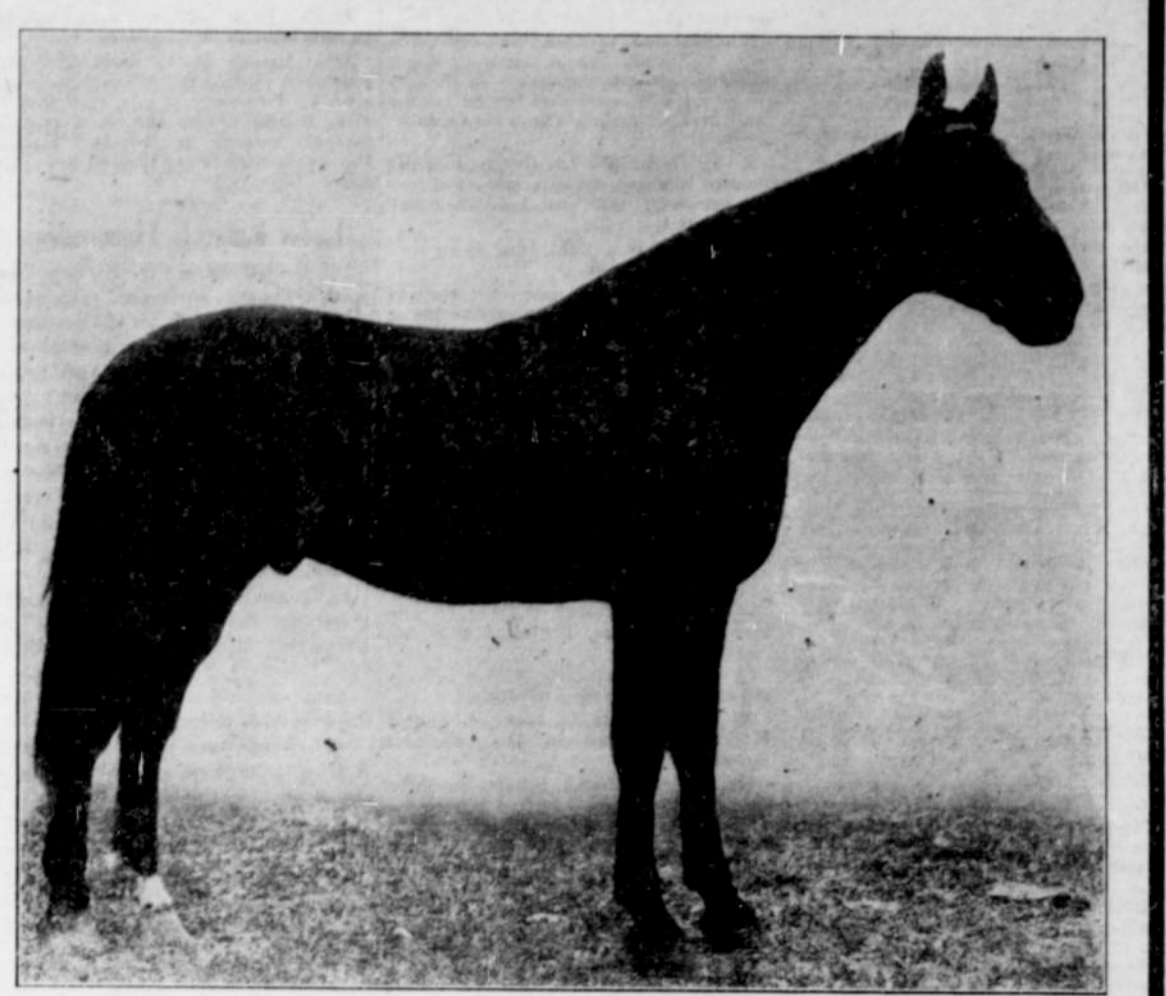
FAIRVIEW
