Ordinance No. 39.

An ordinance regulating the manner of openings for entrance and exit of public halls and assembly rooms.

Be it ordained by the common council of the Town of Gresham:

Section 1. That any person, firm, company or corporation maintaining within the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham any hall or rooms wherein public or secret society assemblies are held, shall have the main entrance door so affixed that the same will swing and open outward from the building. Provided, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed to mean any hall or rooms located upon the ground floor.

Section 2. That the penalty for any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5) nor more than twenty dollars (\$20).
