Secures Option on Grounds

Gresham, the enterprising little city in the eastern part of the county, has secured an option on a tract of land near by and has invited the Grange Fair association to use it as a sight for holding the agricultural fair this fall. The proposition extended by Mayor Short of Gresham at a meeting of the association held Thursday night was accepted by the directors. The association will be incorporated with a capital of \$5,000 and arrangements made at once to get the fair under way. It is the intention of the directors of the fair association to erect commodious and permanent fair buildings in time for this year's fair.—Oregon Journal.

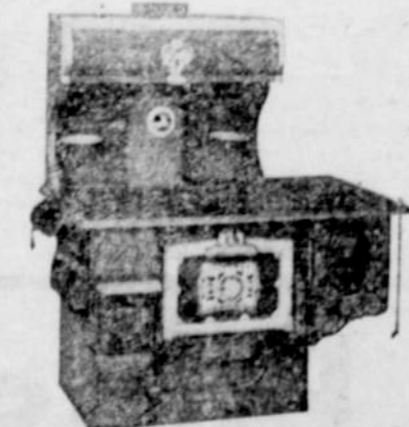
