We have been interested, amused, disgusted with some of the methods used here lately to get advertising without paying for it. Any local that praises the merits of a product, dealer, or place of business, is practically an ad. and should be charged as a reading notice. Unless some of our friends look out they will be surprised by a bill for advertising service rendered. If you have anything worth while, don't be ashamed or "too cheap" to advertise it. If you are making a profit you can afford to share with the one who helps bring those profits.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

That Gresham real estate is not in demand is evidently untrue as shown by the remarkably good price paid by local investors. The Studdars tract was not wanting for bidders last Tuesday when placed on auction at the courthouse. Bidders from the city and country, especially from the vicinity of the tract and from Gresham, all eager to have a slice of the tract or to take it unbroken. How many other small towns have the support of the people's confidence to such a degree? And better, too, since the town has confidence in itself. There is no "boom" in Gresham; its development has been a normal, healthy growth. So much the better then when property, half cleared, brings \$320 per acre. Of course, the prospects of a permanent fair being established helps some but the advantages of easy communication, good outlying country, abundance of farm products, and cheap fuel, make a location in Gresham desirable. It's bound to grow.

The meeting called to organize the Grange Fair association on Tuesday might have been considered a failure if other matters had not been taken up that were almost equally as important. It is necessary that as large a number of stockholders be present at the next meeting as can possibly come. No organization can be effected unless a majority of the stock is represented at that meeting. Again, it is absolutely necessary that every stockholder sign and return the cards sent out requesting the privilege of an early meeting, attach their signatures to one of the papers being circulated for that purpose or be personally present to give consent. Don't forget the date, Tuesday, August 18th, at 2:30 p. m., at Gresham.

The opportunities for better work at the Agricultural College have been greatly enlarged by the purchase of adjoining property. Such an institution must have room. Aside from a suitable building site, space is necessary. The additional acreage will mean much to those who have to plan the illustrative and experimental work of the institution. GRANGE NEWS IN BRIEF

Lents grange met Saturday as usual. The attendance was small, so many of the members being away on vacations, visiting or too busy with midsummer work. Some attention was given to the new grange paper, The Pacific-Grange Bulletin. Mr. Darnall being present, explanation of the plan of the paper was made. It is now understood that the newspaper will come out a little late this month owing to delays caused by adapting itself to new conditions but it will probably be out soon after the 28th. Mr. Miller made inquiries about advertising. It is desirable that a fair show of advertising be made—the first month as success in this line will depend upon the showing made at first. So all grangers are solicited to use the "Patrons Exchange," in which the advertising rate will be 1c per word.

A discussion of the method of canning fruit or vegetables by the "cold process" was entered by Mr. Young whose experiences had been very unfavorable. Others who had tried it faced likewise. Mrs. Fairbanks reported that she had tried that process and found it a success but she had found it necessary to crush berries and use considerable sugar.

It was found that some \$700 had been subscribed to the grange hall stock. Motion was made to proceed to organize with a capital of \$3500 and afterward increase it if necessary. The committee was authorized to proceed with the incorporation. Friday evening, August 21, was the date set for a meeting of stock subscribers for the consideration of further plans. A committee was appointed to begin the foundation arrangements, do some hauling and other preliminary work.
