NEW YORK GRANGES.

Year's Record Is Likely to Be Broken In 1908.

Movement to Secure a Change In National Representation.

At the last meeting of the New York state grange its executive committee was instructed to co-operate with the state grange with a view to secure er voting power in the national grange than states with merely nominal membership. New York state has 77,000 members and Michigan nearly 50,000. New York paid into the national grange treasury last year \$3,616 and Michigan \$2,231, and yet these two states have no greater voting strength in the national grange than Minnesota, which and Iowa, which paid \$19.33. It would seem that there was a decided injustice in such method of representation, and the question of changing the method, basing representation upon membership, is likely to be an important one at the next meeting of the national

A Thriving Pomona.

Hillsborough county Pomona of New Hampshire had over 400 Patrons at the observance of its twenty-fifth anniversary. It was the largest assemblage of members ever present at a closed session in New Hampshire. This Pomona grange was the first ever organized. It has held more meetings and had more masters, according to Secretary Drake of New Hampshire state grange, than any other superior grange in the world.
