TROUTDALE, Ore., Aug. 25.—Troutdale city council have appropriated \$5 per month toward the maintenance of the library and reading room. This amount will be used in paying the rent of the building and purchasing fuel. Ordinance No. 27, which has just been adopted by the council, makes it unlawful to have painted or frosted windows, screens or curtains in front of saloon windows at a height of four feet above the sidewalk. Ninety days has been given to those who have such obstructions to remove the same. The use of pool tables on Sunday in any public building has been forbidden. The violation of this ordinance will be subject to a fine of \$50 or two days in jail or both.

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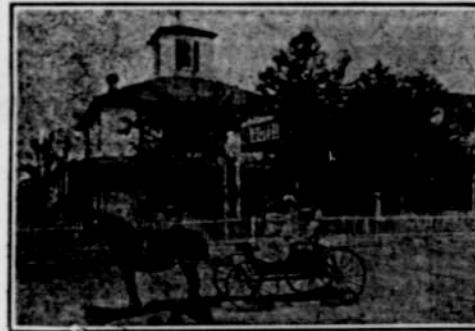
