The librarian met the teachers one day this week at the invitation of Prof. Baker to discuss plans for mutual helpfulness.

It has been decided to issue campers' tickets to those who want to put tents on the ground and spend several days at the fair. There is ample room in the grounds back of the building and near the grove where tents may be placed and there is no reason why a large number of people living at a distance should not be permitted to tent on the ground. There will be water in abundance, free to all who wish to use it. Straw may be obtained at a reasonable figure and very comfortable quarters for the entire fair season arranged in a short time by coming with wagon, tent or some feed and provisions a family could enjoy the entire season for \$10 at the outside, and have a first-class time. There is an abundance of camper's fuel free for the using and the only limitation would be the care of property.

Plans are maturing rapidly for the Live Stock Exhibit to be held at Grange Fair, Gresham, October 6-10, 1908.

The sheds are well along now for the stock exhibit. Stalls have been constructed to care for 60 head of stock already, and the material will be ready for the erection of other stalls if the entire demand it. It is fully expected that there will be need of over a hundred. The pens for sheep and hogs will be put up this week. The next issue of The Beaver State Herald will contain a large part of the premium list, a copy of which may be obtained by writing and the complete premium lists will be ready to go out by the last of the week.

Baby Show at Gresham Fair.

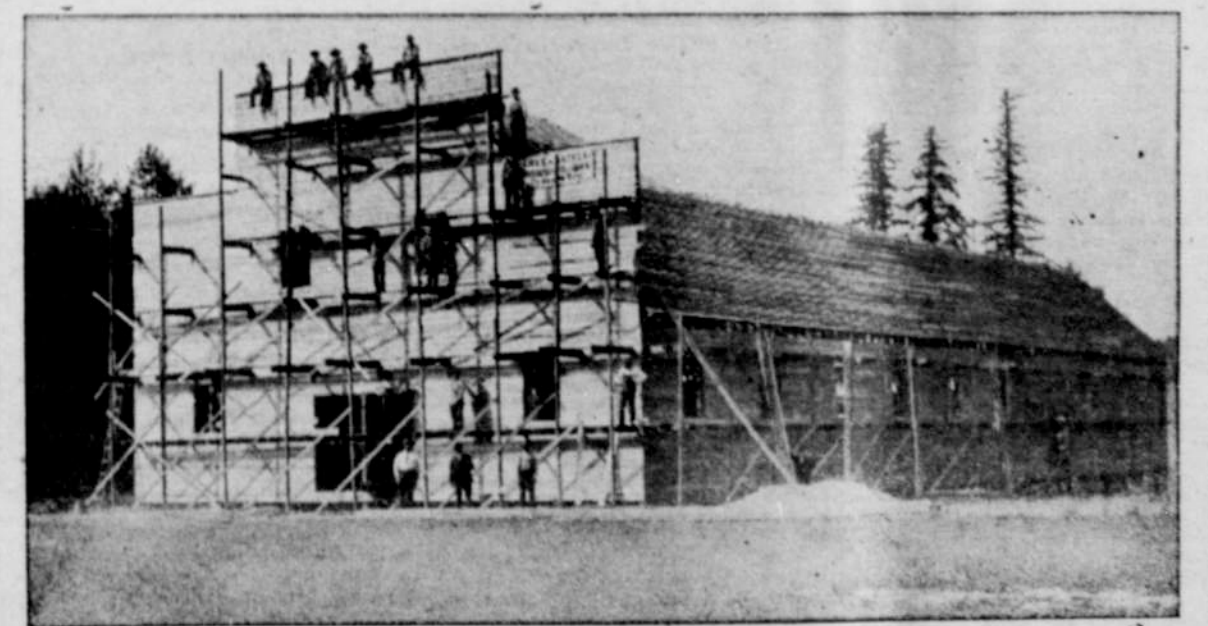
