Your attention is called to the trans-state roadway by a recent article in the Telegram. It appears that the principal outgrowth of the recent conference in Portland is a legislative committee, whose report shall be kept quiet until after it has been presented to the legislature. Now, from absolutely safe information, we are at liberty to say that at least two members of that committee are vigorously working for a state roadway, built by state money, the essential object in building which will be to provide a scenic driveway for tourists who drive gas wagons.

The road may eventually have branches reaching to communities near the main line. But as Judge Scott says, "the great benefit to be derived from such a road will be the money that is left in the state by the tourists who drive across it in their autos." Now any sane man knows that is hot air. Pelican Bay needs an outlet so Portland nabobs can run down when Mr. Harriman is out on his vacation. That class of tourists will cross the state between sun and sunset, and the help it will be to the farming community that has to drag to town through muddy ways will never be felt.

What we need is a safe sane road commission that will direct the use of a certain state appropriation in each county so that every town will have radiating from it a few miles of first-class road. The good it would do in stimulating the road movement would be immeasurable and it would do the people that need roads some good.
