## FAIRVIEW

Death of Jacob Holgate. Jacob Holgate, who passed away at the home of his son, E. D. Holgate, on Base Line road on Sept. 24, was a pioneer of Oregon, having come here from Illinois in 1852, with his wife and one son. They settled at what is now Corvallis, but afterward went to Alsea Valley from the Alsea Bay, where they have since resided. In going from Corvallis to Alsea they were compelled to go by pack trail and for eleven months after reaching there they did not see a white woman. They were seven months crossing the plains. Mr. Holgate was born in Pennsylvania in 1825. When five years of age he went with his parents to Illinois and on May 7, 1846, was married to Miss Alvena Williams. Twelve children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Holgate, all of whom are living. Grandma Holgate is still living but was not able to attend the funeral which was held from Carlson & Henderson's undertaking parlors at Gresham last Sunday at 11 o'clock. Rev. W. T. Scott conducted the services. Interment was in River-view cemetery. A special car conveyed the relatives and friends from Gresham to the cemetery.

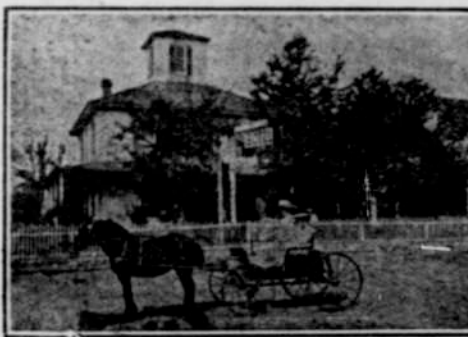
