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## SECOND ANNUAL FAIR A GRAND SUCCESS

Will Take Weeks to Tell the Whole Story—Items from Reporter's Notebook.

The formal opening of the Second Annual Grange Fair and Festival took place Tuesday at noon under most favorable auspices. The opening day was Grange day.

Master of the State Grange Austin T. Buxton and State Lecturer J. J. Johnson were each on hand Tuesday with a good address.

The Multnomah County and Grange Fair Association closed up its business Tuesday and turned over to the new Grange Fair Association \$445.

About 500 people attended the opening, nearly 200 more than last year.

The ball game did not come off on scheduled time Tuesday, the Canby team failing to show up, but in the afternoon Eagle Creek and Gresham battled to the tune of 9 to 5. For the first six innings it looked like it would be a shut-out with a score of 6 to 0, but Eagle Creek rallied and ran in five scores making it a very exciting game.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the fair association was held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30. Report was made by the secretary of the general financial condition of the association, though a definite statement could not be issued. It was decided that the directors now acting should retain their positions another year.

The program given by the Lents Grange on Tuesday evening was highly commended by many.

Attention is due the department of art. Many very fine exhibits have been made and several loans for the public benefit occupy good places. Among those who have made loans appear the names of C. E. S. Wood, Fred Merrill, and Oregon School of Art.

The straight furrow plowing contest will be held Saturday at 3 p. m. The plow is the prize. Boys from 17 to 21 have a chance to win a fine Oliver Chilled Plow.

The log sawing contest was a failure because there were no entries.

The largest apple on exhibition, 10 3/4 inches around, was grown on Beaver creek, being one inch larger in circumference than the big Sandy Valley apple.

The entertainment given last night by the Gresham grange was well attended. Every number was encored.

John Townsend got first prize on his agricultural display.

E. Coleman and E. P. Smith are get-

ting a lot of credit for their fine fruit display.

About 2000 people attended the Fair yesterday. A big day is looked for today and the biggest day Saturday.

Rev. Paroungian was born in Armenia but educated for the ministry in this country. He has a winning manner, a direct and clear utterance which promises for him a large usefulness.



All Its Departments of Immediate Practical Value to the Farming Interests.

Class room inspection and comparison of different varieties of corn developed a basis of selection that brought the results. How can a man know anything about an animal's merits unless he knows how to judge its defects. Here are two pictures which our agricultural college is offering the young men of the

tate an opportunity to acquire the month old. Perhaps it will. But it will yield more and better returns if it has a good, clean roost, proper nestings, good food and pure water. One merit we observe in these cuts is that they suggest small coops. Small coops prevent crowding, are easily kept clean and free from vermin, and they are inexpensive.
