> The amendment adopted in Minnesota at the last general election contained the clause that "The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects, and shall be levied and collected for public purposes." An amendment containing a clause identical in form with the above is pending in the State of Washington. Practically the same amendment is pend-

The Ohio tax commission in aiming to secure such adequate scope of powers for the Ohio General Assembly suggested that, "It may classify the subjects of taxation so far as their differences justify the same in order to secure a just return from each." This suggestion was adopted by the Ohio Legislature and such an amendment initiated.
