The teamster from Rhododendron with four horses, tipped over and broke the reach and tongue of the wagon the other day while hauling hay.

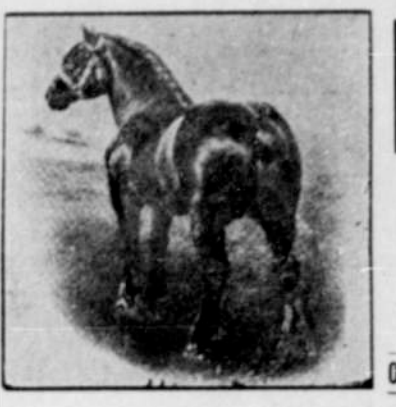
WELCHES
