One of the saddest funerals to which alike were bidden to attend friends and neighbors occurred on Saturday morning when all that was mortal of Lillian Irene, the beloved daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gildenmeister of Taylorville avenue, was laid to rest in Multnomah cemetery. The idolized child of loving parents, her untimely death came as a shock to all. Ill but a short time and with her feet just at life's threshold, the announcement of her passing threw a pall of grief over the entire neighborhood and in her school circle where her loss will be deeply felt.

Aged fourteen, she was born in Chicago, Sept. 8, 1895.

Her sweet personality and gentle nature, combined with loving obedience to her parents, makes her loss almost unendurable in the home where the vacant chair and girlish absence will speak in mute eloquence of the little hands laid across the quiet breast.
