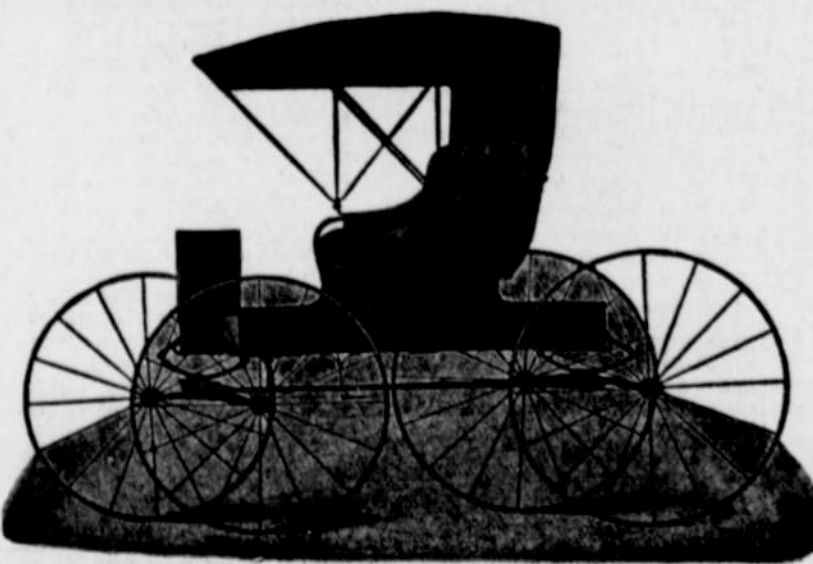

As the above caption is the slogan that has been sent out over the state by the temperance forces, it would be well and most timely, for us to examine into some of the facts concerning this proposition. What would be the gain to us if no license prevailed? As this is preeminently a farming state, we turn to facts for the farmer and wage-earner in general, first.

The bone and sinew of our national body is the labor world, and if it can be shown that it would be of great advantage to the industrial world to have the state dry in 1910, then we are bound to work for it.

We submit a few authoritative facts from the Enquirer.

## What Does Liquor Do for the Farmer?

Value of farm products, 1907..... \$5,160,687,634  
Liquor manufacturers claim to buy of the farmer..... 110,309,067  
Which is not quite 2.2 per cent. For every dollar which the farmer receives for his product, liquor pays 2.2 cents.
