B. W. Emery consented to act as clerk of Market Day for the present and will list all articles sent to him for private sale or auction. You should notify him as soon as possible of any articles you expect to bring to the next Market Day, Wednesday, June 23.

The clerk was authorized to advertise listed articles at the expense of the Development League. The earlier they are listed the more chance of securing buyers. Articles for private sale should be listed early and will be advertised free of cost.

E. P. Smith, of the Eastwood Nurseries, suggested to the League a plan for a Cherry Festival, to be held about the middle of July. His idea was to secure the co-operation of cherry growers throughout this section, get together several thousand pounds of choice cherries and invite the public to come and see and taste the products of the orchards of this region. The plan will be found more fully stated in another column. The suggestions were acted on favorably by the League and a committee, of which Mr. Smith is chairman, was appointed as a Cherry Day committee.

So far the meetings of the Club have been business meetings mainly. It was thought that it was about time to have a meeting for promoting good fellowship among the members and listening to speeches for the general welfare and growth of the League and interest others in the work the League is doing. It was decided to have a banquet in the near future and Dr. Ott, Mr. Egan and D. M. Roberts were appointed a committee to make arrangements for the same.

The Publicity Committee reported on some plans for sending out information about Gresham and the surrounding country.

Postal Information

will be returned to you, and not be sent to the dead letter office.

Don't forget to put a stamp on your letter, or better still buy your envelopes already stamped, you can get twenty-five for fifty-four cents. You can get them from your carrier or at the post-office.

When wishing to send money always purchase a money order, for if sent in this manner and it is lost, the postoffice department will issue a duplicate. If you wish to send money to "ye home folks" in the old country, there is no safer way than an INTERNATIONAL MONEY ORDER.

Valuable mail should be sent first-class, and registered, for the postoffice department will make good any loss in the mail not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25).

When you mail a letter, or package, see that it is substantially done up. The rapid handling of the mails sometimes destroys a poor envelope, or covering of a package, and your mail is thus lost.

When you move to another postoffice notify the postmaster of your former postoffice to forward your mail. All first-class, letters, cards and sealed matter will be forwarded without extra postage. Other mail you will be notified of on an official card of the amount of postage required to forward the article. Also notify the postmaster of your new address to hold your mail until called for.

Notify the publishers of your papers that you have changed your postoffice, and give them your new address.

Letters from the Pension Agency can be delivered only to party addressed, or to some one of his or her family authorized to receive the same.

If you have a friend visiting you have their mail sent in your care.

If you receive a letter by mistake, that is not yours, do not open it, but return to the office; but if you by mistake open it, write on the envelope opened by mistake and show your name.

It is advisable for rural patrons to keep on hand a supply of stamped envelopes, postal cards, one and two cent stamps. You can get them from your carrier.

Don't get vexed if your carrier or the postoffice force sometimes make a mistake. We all make mistakes sometimes. We are only human. See that your box is kept in good order. If the hinges need oiling, attend to it. If your box is not convenient for the carrier to drive up to, change it.

If it is necessary to place coin in the box for stamps, do not put it loose in the box, but put in an old envelope or cup.

Don't place packages or letters in your mail box for the carrier to deliver to some one else on the route free. It requires postage.

Put your letters and cards crossways of the box, and not lengthways. It is easier to pick up. Always have your letters ready when the carrier arrives. Have your mail addressed, and if you wish a money order, always have the
