WHAT

MOCHA?

ALL the Arabian coffee goes under the name of Mocha, though none grows nearer than 100 miles from that town, which is situated to the north of Strait of Bab el Mandeb. That district supplies Turkey and Egypt, and through them its product makes its way into some other markets.
