### Large Audience Hears Mr. Knodell

A large and appreciative audience heard James R. Knodell, president of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, at the Methodist church Sunday night. His theme was along the line of what has been accomplished by the united efforts of the moral and home-loving people of this country in their endeavor to crush out the liquor curse. In his analysis of the progress made, the speaker displayed large maps of the state of Oregon showing 21 counties in which no liquor is sold, these counties having been won to prohibition in the past five years. As to the country as a whole, he stated that Maine, Kansas, Dakota, Georgia, Oklahoma, Alabama, Mississippi, North Carolina and Tennessee now carry the white banner at the helm as an indication that the battle has been fought and won. In this connection Mr. Knodell paid a deserving tribute to the Women's Christian Temperance Union and other organizations looking to the eradicating of this evil. He predicted that in 1910 Oregon would swell the number in the dry column.

The music rendered by the choir was highly appreciated and deserves special mention in its having added pleasure to the evening's services.

### COFFEE TALK NO. 1

ALL the Arabian coffee goes under the name of Mocha, though none grows nearer than 100 miles from that town, which is situated to the north of Strait of Bab el Mandeb. That district supplies Turkey and Egypt, and through them its product makes its way into some other markets. Curiously enough, the Mocha bought at Cairo or Alexandria is invariably better than that bought at Mocha itself. The reason is very simple. The Turkish and Egyptian traders go to Arabia before the harvest and buy the crop on the tree.
