How to Purify Rainwater.

Rainwater is one of the best washes for the complexion in existence, but clean rainwater is often hard to get. For after every shower the water from the barrels is black with soot, etc., washed off the roof. To prevent this and to secure clean rainwater, get a bit of coarse, close canvas and make a little bag of it. Into this bag put some clean gravel, and tie the bag on to the end of the pipe, so that the water will have to pass through the gravel before reaching the barrel. The gravel makes a capital filter, and if it is changed from time to time and the barrel be kept clean you will always have clean soft water when required for any purpose.

How to Lengthen Life of a Pillowcase.

Every housewife knows how soon pillowcases wear out, but it took a remarkably clever woman to see at a glance how she could prolong their lives. When her pillowcases are beginning to show signs of wear she takes out the seam at the bottom of the case and turns it round, so that the side seams come directly up in the middle. Then she reseams the bottom. It is easy to see that this will bring the side of the pillow under the head, where the wear would come, so the pillowcase will last longer. A better idea could not be found, and who minds sewing up a pillowcase seam?

How to Wash Silk Gloves.

Silk gloves should be washed in warm water and with pure white soap and should then be rinsed in several clear waters of the same temperature. Then, instead of hanging them up to dry by the wrists, hang them up by the tips of the fingers. To do this pin each finger out on a cloth and hang up the cloth with the arms of the gloves hanging down. This lets the water run into the parts of the gloves that receive the least wear and lets the tips, which receive the most wear, dry the quickest.

Western Agricultural Paper, tells of having some 200 little chickens killed by crows during one season, they having had a nesting place in a nearby grove and she not realizing the source of the depredations until most of her chicks were done for. This and other evidence of the destructiveness of the crow to eggs and young chickens would seem to show that as an enemy of the poultry raiser the crow has the hawk, mink and skunk tribes beaten all to pieces.

There are certain sections in the north central states where tests with alfalfa have proved conclusively that it is futile to try to raise it unless chickens have the run of the field devoted to its growth and are able to keep the grasshopper pest in check. Where poultry is not about the hoppers pounce on to the young plants when they are in the second or third leaf and annihilate them, in which performance they show good insect judgment, for it is quite likely the most succulent and nutritious herbage to be found at that season of the year.

Geraniums, like boys, are often the better off for an outdoor summer vacation. Prune them back (the geraniums) considerably, remove from the pots and put them in a garden spot where they will get a good deal of sunshine. Before setting in the ground put a good shovelful of rotten manure beneath each plant, and during the drier weather see that they get plenty of water. If this course is followed it will mean lots of bloom in late summer and good strong plants to pot in the fall.
