gone to Seaside for a few days outing.

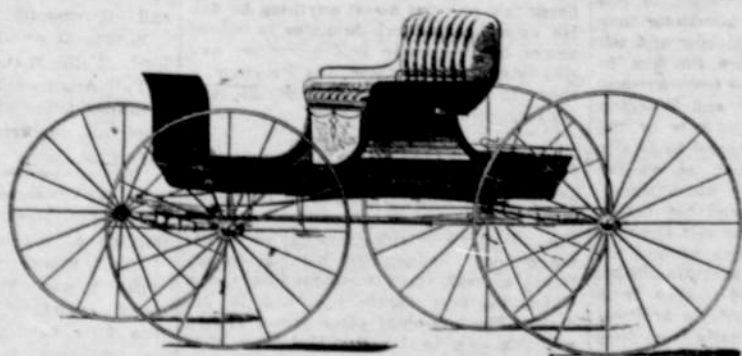
Rev. Moore will hold service here on
