The cost of a bridge across the Columbia at that point would be almost prohibitive and practically useless. While the Mt. Hood outlet would be nearer, cheaper and from the point of local travel, far more valuable.

Now, the people do not care who builds the road. They would like to see something done and that pretty soon, but since they have waited thus long they probably will be able to wait a few weeks longer.
