EDITORIAL COMMENT

THE penalty of birth is the unfolding drama of the soul's destiny. Our work was born in us and we alone are held responsible for the manner and the use we make of it. We are living in an age of applied scientific research. What is life; whence did it come, and what is its ultimate destiny? are still unsolved questions, but in the attempted solving of them we are getting a better understanding of self and of accountability. And the clearer our insight of self, the easier and happier and wiser is the path of life.

The supreme joy of toddling childhood is work. Froebel discovered it and diverted these heretofore wasted energies of the child into daily lessons of educational value. It was not until we knelt at the cradle did we learn the power of heredity and environment as shaping forces of every life. It is not so many years ago that the only consideration the child received was its existence, and that a certain number of years had to intervene before the child was really ready to start on its journey of education. Today that idea is all changed, a striking instance of which is embodied in our present school system, for instead of crowding as many little ones into one room with an indifferent teacher, the best system of sanitation and the best equipped teacher are accorded them.

As in the child, so throughout all the stages of the further development of life's possibilities, work after all may become a joy instead of a drudgery. No one can dodge it and get out of life its highest attainment. The idler is a misfit. The world has no place for him. It is only the worker who is wanted—and the quicker and surer this truth reigns absolutely in the boy and girl, the larger shall be their measure of joy and success as the years come and go.

Lord Cromer, in a recent address in England, gave this advice to the boys: "Love your country, tell the truth, and do not dawdle." Truths as applicable to men and women as to boys and girls. The love of country fosters a true pride, trustworthiness and unselfishness. It quickens ambition, kindles hope and arouses to definite action the larger self. To be the embodiment of truth—a living, truth-telling force—to tell the truth under all circumstances, brings out the divine part of man and in a large degree he holds himself to a strict accountability for his every thought and deed, and seeks what is best and noblest and worthiest in the realm of human existence.

The dawdler is but a half-hearted person. "He is always at half cock when a crisis comes. He lives continually under the shadow of his work, which oppresses his brain and his con-

science, but never gets itself properly done. He is neither spending his strength valiantly nor keeping it fallow for future use." Don't be a dawdler. There is too much at stake. Life is too big an asset and opportunities too few and tests are too exacting and merciless for one to be deaf to the appealing voices that cry out work, work, work.

Lowell thus fittingly summarizes work:
No man is born into the world, whose work
Is not born with him; there is always work,
And tools to work withal, for those who will;
And blessed are the horny hands of toil!

The busy world shoves angrily aside
The man who stands with arms akimbo set,
Until occasion tells him what to do;
And he who waits to have his task marked out
Shall die and leave his errand unfulfilled.—Swartz' Telephone Siftings.
