The Lecturer of the Michigan State Grange Suggests Specific Methods For Improving Present Conditions. Value of Directed Effort. [Special Correspondence.]

"What in your opinion would Rev. J. H. Wood has assumed charge strengthen the grange and grange work today?" you ask.
