### WITH THE SPORTS.

In a fine exhibition wrestling match Saturday night in Metzger Hall, John Berg, the light-heavyweight champion, was the victor over his opponent, Chas. "Strangler Smith," in three times down. While Berg is the best wrestler on the Pacific Coast—it requiring a grappler of Gutch's proportions to put his shoulders to the mat—it kept him busy when he met the "Little Giant" on this occasion. Smith is not only a strong man at his weight, 134 pounds, but as slick as an eel and at several times eluded the strong hold of the husky champion by his alertness.

The first time down Berg used the dreaded toe hold, which catch has made him famous, and evidently caught Smith by surprise as this feat was accomplished in the first five minutes of the bout. The second time, twenty-one minutes elapsed before Berg threw his man, during which time the audience were given a splendid exhibition of high-class wrestling. A dead hammerlock did the work. The third time on the mat, Smith kept on the defensive and showed signs of weakness caused by the terrible wrenching of his right arm, but gave his opponent a hard tussle for nine minutes, losing by a head hold and body-scissors.

A large crowd was present among whom were many ladies and all were highly pleased with the match.

Jess Dunbar was referee and his decisions were as well received on the mat as on the diamond.

It took 12 rounds for Jack Johnson to knock out Ketchel at Frisco last Saturday, and then was so dazed by the blows of his plucky opponent that he was not aware of the victory. It is now up to James J. Jeffries to quiet the "Big Smoke" which the husky boiler-maker will evidently do ere long.

One of the hardest fought battles in the history of the National game ended at Detroit on Saturday when, after a series of games, Pittsburg copped the world's championship from the Detroit Tigers. Both teams were neck and neck for the coveted goal almost to the last and never before has such interest been exhibited in the outcome of a baseball game.
