### BORING

O. A. Palmer has entered into a contract with the S. P. H. Lumber Co. of Boring to do the planing for the S. P. H. Co. Steam was gotten up in the mill Thursday for the first time in many months. Palmers will plan about 300,000 feet on the first order. The S. P. H. Co. intend to build a planing mill at their yard as soon as possible.
