Notice of Levy of Special Road Tax.

Notice is hereby given that we, the undersigned tax payers representing ten per cent. of the tax payers in Road District No. 7, Clackamas County, Oregon, hereby give notice to the tax payers of said Road District No. 7, that there will be a meeting of the tax payers of said district in the schoolhouse, District No. 45, in Bull Run Precinct, on the 18th day of December, 1909, at 2 o'clock p. m., to vote an additional tax for road purposes as provided by an act of the Legislature in 1909, and which act inter alia provides as follows, to-wit:

The tax payers of any road district in any county of this State may vote an additional tax for road purposes, providing at least ten per cent. of the tax payers of said district shall give notice by posting notices in three public places in said road district and one in Court House, and publish one notice three weeks in one weekly newspaper of general circulation signed by at least ten per cent. of the tax payers of said road district, giving the time, place and object of said meeting, which shall be held in the month of December and at the time of said meeting it shall be organized by the election of a chairman and secretary and at such meeting they may, by a majority vote of such tax payers, levy such an additional tax as they may deem advisable to improve the roads of said district, and if a tax be levied, it shall be the duty of said chairman and secretary to certify to the County Clerk of such county, prior to January 1st, the levy so made by the tax payers of said district and that the County Clerk shall compute and extend said levy on the assessment roll for that year the same as other taxes are extended, and it shall be the duty of the tax collector to proceed to collect said taxes in money the same as any other taxes are collected and turn the same over to the County Treasurer in the same manner and at the same time he pays over other taxes collected by him, and shall be credited and kept by the Treasurer to the account of the road district making such levy.
