Ordinance No. 48

AN ORDINANCE providing for the issuance of bonds for the purchase of material and for the hiring and procuring of agents, laborers and servants for the construction and installation of a general sewer and drainage system for the town of Gresham, and for the procuring of right of ways therefor, and to do all other things necessary or convenient in connection with the installing, constructing and maintaining a general sewer and drainage system for the town of Gresham.

Whereas, by an act approved by a vote of the electors of the town of Gresham at the general election held in

said town of Gresham on the first Tuesday in December, 1909, paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the town of Gresham, entitled "An act to incorporate the town of Gresham in the county of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 11, 1905, was amended so as to authorize and empower the common council of the town of Gresham, and its successors in office, to construct and install a sewer and drainage system for the town of Gresham and its inhabitants, and to construct and install all necessary pipes, drains, manholes, catch basins, branches, septic tanks, and to do all other things of every kind or nature which shall by said common council and its successors in office be deemed necessary and convenient for the installing, maintaining and establishing of a general sewer and drainage system of the town of Gresham, and for that purpose to procure by purchase or otherwise, real property, right of ways or easements necessary or convenient for the carrying out of the aforesaid sewer and drainage system.

And Whereas, said act to provide a fund for the construction of said sewer and drainage system, the purchase of real property therefor, the purchasing and procuring material and labor in the installing and construction of said sewer and drainage system, and for the purpose of constructing pipe lines, septic tanks and other appliances, and for the purpose of doing all other things necessary and convenient in connection with the construction and installing of a general sewer and drainage system of the town of Gresham, authorized and empowered the common council of the town of Gresham, and its successors in office, to issue and dispose of bonds of the town of Gresham to an amount not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) as the council might determine.

And Whereas, said act went into force and effect upon proclamation of the mayor of the town of Gresham, that said act had been passed by a vote of the electors of said town of Gresham at said general election, and filed in the office of the recorder of the town of Gresham on the 4th day of January, 1910.

Now, therefore, Be it ordained by the common council of the town of Gresham:

Section 1. That the common council of the town of Gresham do issue bonds of the town of Gresham in the name of and under the seal of the said town of Gresham in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000), in denominations of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000) each, with interest coupons attached thereto, said bonds to be dated on the day of issue, and to be signed by the mayor and countersigned by the recorder of the town of Gresham, whereby the town of Gresham shall be held and considered in substance and effect to undertake and promise in consideration of the premises, to pay to the bearer of each of said bonds at the expiration of twenty (20) years from the date thereof, the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States of America, together with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum payable half yearly, which bonds shall be known as "Sewer and Drainage Bonds of the town of Gresham, Oregon."

Section 2. That said bonds be advertised for the period of ten (10) days in the official newspaper of the town of Gresham, and in the Daily Oregonian of Portland, Oregon, and the first insertion of said advertisement in said publications be at least thirty (30) days prior to the time set for the opening of said bids, and that the same be awarded to the highest responsible bidder for cash.

Section 3. That the recorder of the town of Gresham be, and he is hereby directed to advertise said bonds in the manner provided by this ordinance, and to include in said advertisement a statement that the council reserves the right to reject any and all bid tendered for said bonds, and to proceed to readvertise the same when said bids are not satisfactory.

Passed the common council of the town of Gresham this 15th day of March, 1910.
