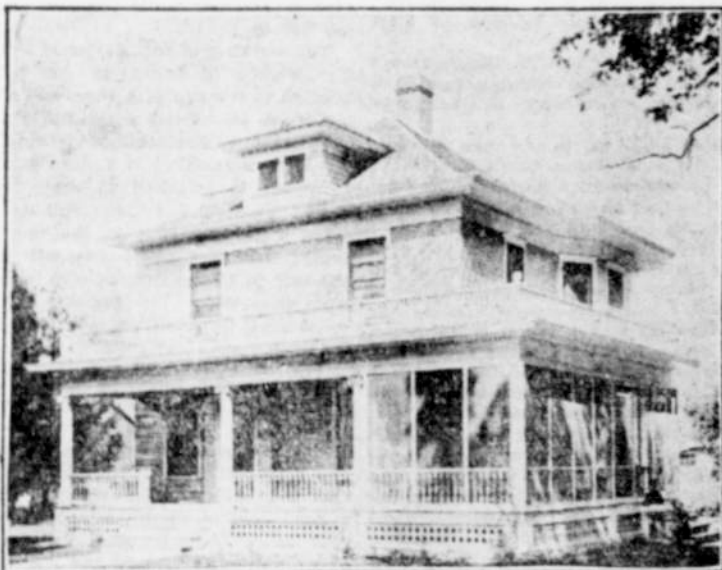

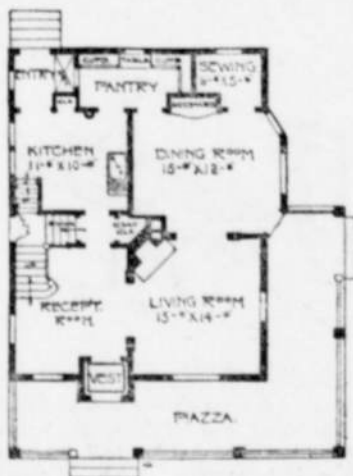

## House With a Double Piazza.

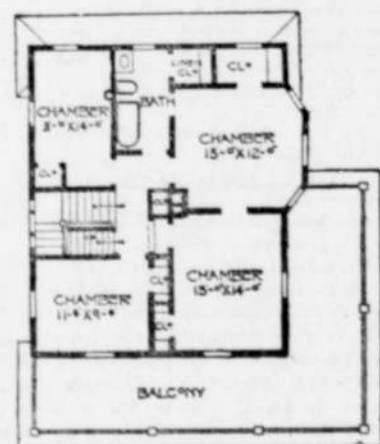
Design 927, by Glenn L. Saxton, Architect.

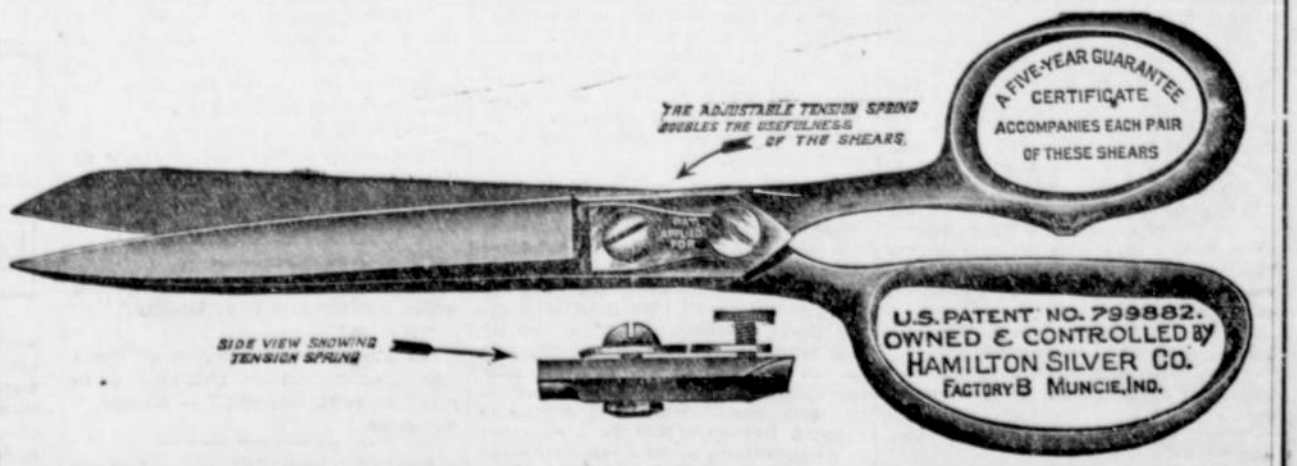
