The morning session was taken up with routine work. After one of the best grange dinners a granger ever sat down to, the work of the afternoon was taken up. Report of the committee on resolutions was the first thing in order.

A resolution favoring state furnishing of text book was lost.

A resolution to limit the speeding of automobiles by amending the auto-license law to prevent the gearing of machines to run over 25 miles per hour, met a better fate.

A resolution favoring the continuance of the rural route system of mails was carried with favorable comment.

A resolution suggested by the National Grange favoring state control of conservation measures met strong opposition and was voted down.

Another resolution, called forth by remarks condemning the action of the so-called "Home Rule League association," met with strong support.

The following resolution was presented, reported favorably and carried without opposition:

Be it Resolved, by Multnomah Pomona in session assembled, That we again declare our firm opposition to the initiative bill now before the people of Oregon providing for a constitutional convention inasmuch as it would place the initiative and referendum, the direct primary, recall and all our reform laws in danger.

Be it further resolved, that we urge the discussion of this question in the granges of the county before election.

The evening session was taken up with a program and initiation of fifth degree candidates.
