The Mount Hood electric road is expected to run cars to Sandy before the end of 1911. When complete, Sandy will be within one hour's ride of Portland, practically making Sandy a suburb of Portland.

Sandy is also on the main line of the Portland, Mount Hood Auto road, on which thousands of dollars were recently spent for improvements, making it one of the greatest scenic auto ways in the west.

Sandy, being surrounded by fertile productive farms and untold wealth of the natural resources of water power timber and mines, and being in close proximity to the great city of Portland, is destined to become a
