Fairview, March 1—Fairview will have a new city charter. A special election for the purpose of adopting or rejecting the new charter was held on Wednesday. Two measures were also voted upon. Thirty-five votes were cast. For the new charter there were 21 for and 13 against. The first measure which provides that the council shall have power to prohibit the sale or giving away in the town of Fairview of spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, carried. The second, which provides that the council shall have power to license, tax or regulate saloons, barrooms, drinking shops and all other places in the town of Fairview where spirituous, malt or vinous liquors are sold, lost.
