Arrangements have been completed between the Oregon Agricultural College and the Willamette Valley Irrigated Land Co. for an experiment station right across from the S. P. depot at West Stayton. The experiment station will adjoin the company's demonstration farm. Irrigation will be available this summer and all kinds of crops will be grown to demonstrate what water during the growing season will do for the farmer.

The sixty-eighth anniversary of the organization of the first civil government on American soil west of the Rocky Mountains will be celebrated at Champog on May 2. This is an interesting historical observance, participated in by the pioneers who made the early history of the Oregon country. The Oregon pioneer association will have charge of the exercises. Many will attend from Portland and other western cities will send delegations.

The Herald received a letter from W. E. Metzger of Corvallis this week which may be of considerable service to some of the farmers of this locality. We have been hearing from time to time about the effects of "staggerweed" upon livestock. Mr. Metzger has been making some investigations and with the assistance of a couple of the O. A. C. professors has arrived at the following formula, which he tells us will give satisfactory relief: 10 grains potassium permanganate, 10 grains aluminum sulphate. Add to one quart of water and give as a drench. The remedy is not expensive and may be kept on hand for a long time if kept corked tightly.
