The fight was broken up by Justice Shelley with the assistance of men he deputized. A knife was taken away from one man and it looked for awhile that there was bound to be a serious end to the fight. Warrants will be issued at once for the arrest of ten or twelve men who were implicated. Early in the day a bunch of Aims sawmill men came to Sandy with the intention of picking a row with the Sandy boys and their leader was heard to say that they would clean up Sandy before they left the town. For years these fights have gone on in the Sandy saloon without much interference. If men wanted to fight they fought, and there was seldom anyone to interfere. It was always the survival of the fittest and the man who got his head punched went home and said nothing. When men wanted to swear in the streets they swore and if they wanted to use vulgar language they used it. It made no difference whether ladies were passing or not. It seems impossible that such conditions could have existed so long within 25 miles of
