GRESHAM MAY GET CARNEGIE LIBRARY

Reported He Favors this Place—Committee at Work—Must Raise 10 per cent for Maintenance.

The Gresham Commercial Club has again opened the way for a public library building by appointing a committee to assist the County Library Commission in securing a \$10,000 Carnegie building. Miss Mary Isom, head of the Portland library was in Gresham this week, bringing with her the welcome information that Gresham is being considered by Andrew Carnegie for one of his gifts in that line. Miss Isom was in New York lately and took the matter up with Mr. Carnegie and was tentatively promised the building if ten per cent of the cost would be guaranteed for its maintenance. That amount will be forthcoming easily enough and a suitable building site will be thrown in for good measure. The committee appointed to work with Miss Isom and the Library Association consists of O. M. Nelson, Charles Cleveland and Dr. A. Thompson.

The Gresham branch library ranks the highest of all the Portland library branches and can easily support the new library should it be installed. It is planned to go ahead at once and it would not be surprising to see a new \$10,000 building go up before another year has passed away.
