COMMERCE COURT GRANTS INJUNCTION

Long and Short Haul Clause Constitutional, But "Spokane Rates" Are Held Up.

Washington—In the majority opinion of the Commerce Court, handed down in the transcontinental rate cases, it is held that the long and short haul provision of the interstate commerce act is constitutional. Temporary injunction against putting the so-called "Spokane rates" into effect, however, is granted.

The Court, however, declares that the Interstate Commerce Commission exceeded its authority in attempting to establish a relation between long and short-haul rates, irrespective of absolute rates, and it enjoins the Commission from putting in force the order reducing transcontinental freight rates pending a more complete investigation by the Court.

The Commerce Court reached the conclusion that the cases involved in the present proceeding afforded the best possible opportunity for a determination of the constitutionality of the long-and-short-haul provision of the act to regulate commerce. It was realized that the question eventually would have to be fought out before the United States Supreme Court.

Holy War is Imminent.
Tripoli.—Reports here from adjacent states say that a jihad, or holy war, is imminent through all North Africa. Advances have reached General Caneva, the Italian commander, that Arab delegations are in Tunis inviting their fellow Mohammedans there to cross the Tripoli frontier and join in a war of extermination.

MUST WAIT SEVEN YEARS
Control of Papers Will Not Yet Pass Into Hands of Pulitzer's Sons.
New York.—Not until Herbert, the 14-year-old son of the late Joseph Pulitzer, becomes 21 years of age and has had some little experience in the publishing business, will the actual control of the Pulitzer newspapers, the New York World and the St. Louis Globe-Dispatch, pass into the hands of the famous editor's sons. Mr. Pulitzer never saw his youngest son, who was born five years after the publisher was stricken blind, but the lad had been the constant companion of his father during his declining years and the terms of Mr. Pulitzer's will indicate that he thought Herbert promised to have great ability.

The terms of the will provide that all the Pulitzer boys come into control of the newspaper properties at the same time. Mr. Pulitzer evidently thought the best way to turn over the guidance to his sons would be when Herbert, the youngest, reached maturity.

RATE INVESTIGATION OPENS
Data Assembled for Detailed Hearing of Distance Tariff Controversy.
Salem, Ore.—With a small mountain of plates and especially prepared tables in readiness, with all of its engineers called in and promise of attendance of members of the Washington Commission, as well as many consumers and railroad men, the State Railroad Commission has started what promises to be the most momentous hearing in the history of Oregon railroads when it will pass on the distance tariffs of the O.-W. R. & N., the Southern Pacific and the Corvallis & Eastern.

Mileage of these roads covers practically all of the important railroad territory in the state, and while it is probable that when the question is settled by the commission it will be carried to the highest courts, nevertheless the start is the beginning of one of the biggest wholesale rate probes that the state has known.

TAFT PLANS NEW ANTI-TRUST LAWS

Washington.—President Taft discussed with Attorney General Wickersham the advisability of supplemental anti-trust legislation at the coming session of Congress.

The conference related particularly to the likelihood of passing a Federal incorporation act. It was pointed out that a provision of this kind might be made to allow corporations whose method of doing business was in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law to reorganize under a Federal act.

It is known that the President has in mind renewing his recommendation along these lines in his message to Congress. The House Democrats it is declared will push legislation along this line, whatever may be the administration's determination in the matter.
