

COMMERCE COURT **GRANTS INJUNCTION**

Long and Short Hau! Clause Constitutional, But "Spokane Rates" Are Held Up.

Washington.-In the majority opinon of the Commerce Court, handed down in the transcontinental rate Oregon, Portland, Ore. cases, it is held that the long andthort haul provision of the interstate commerce act is constitutional. Temporary injunction against putting the 71, Greeham. Ore. so-called "Spokane rates" into effect, however, is granted.

The Court, however, declares that the Interstate Commerce Commission exceeded its authority in attempting the Interstate Commerce Commission in any quantity in Lents for \$5 a cord.

The Commerce Court reached the conclusion that the cases involved in the present proceding afforded the best possible opportunity for a determination of the constitutionality of the long-and-short-haul provision of the act to regulate commerce. It was realized that the question eventually would have to be fought out before the United States Supreme Court.

Holy War Is Imminent.

Tripoli.-Reports here from adjacent states say that a jehad, or holy war, is imminent through all North Africa. Advices have reached General Caneva, the Italian commander, that Arab delegations are in Tunis inviting their fellow Mohammedans there to cross the Tripoli frontier and join in a war of extermination.
