TOM WORD DEMANDS \$20,000 OF CHAS. CLEVELAND

The trial of the case of Tom M. Word, ex-Sheriff, against Charles and Anna Cleveland, in which the plaintiff demands approximately \$20,000 because of the alleged failure of the defendants, husband and wife, to transfer property on which he obtained an option, was commenced before Judge Kavanaugh Tuesday.

Mr. Word declared that he took an option on 14 1/2 acres near Gresham at \$55,000, paying \$1000 for the option. The property was misdescribed and subsequently the defendants are alleged to have refused to correct the error and let the deal go through. The plaintiff declares the property is really worth about \$75,000 and asks to be awarded the difference between the option price and that amount as damages. Experts put on the stand placed the value of the property roughly at \$400 an acre.
