EXPENSES FOR NEXT YEAR WILL BE \$746,000,000?

Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh, in the figures sent to congress to cover the next fiscal year, estimates that it will take about \$746,000,000 to run the government. If congress should accept his figures—which of course it will not—this would be a saving of \$21,000,000 from this year, he says. The estimates include a number of items that congress will never stand for, while congress in turn will want to run in a number of its own pet schemes which the estimates do not include and which will swell the total. Increased outlays for the army and navy are asked for, and congress is in no mood to grant these; it would rather spend the money on things that will make more votes. It is expected that the postal service will be self-sustaining, and so it no longer figures as a liability for the year. Postmaster-General Hitchcock asks for \$50,000 to establish an experimental parcels-post system on rural routes and a like amount for an aerial post "by aeroplane or other devices." Chairman Fitzgerald of the house committee on appropriations does not like the style of arithmetic which Secretary MacVeagh uses in figuring his estimates. Instead of being a saving over this year, he says the totals show an increase of \$21,000,000. The army, navy and postal estimates, he declares, are "shocking," and he intimates that what the Democratic house will do to them will be "a plenty."
