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HEDGE DEFEATS BURDICK EASILY

Takes Handicap Pool Match by Score of 125 to 206—Large Crowd Witnesses The Contest.

Marvin K. Hedge defeated "Lefty" Burdick in a handicap pool match before a large crowd at Mac's Billiard Parlors here Monday evening.

The match was pulled off as scheduled, 125 to 206, and was as good a contest as has been witnessed here in a long time. After each had practiced 15 minutes referee Webster called the game. The contestants lagged for break, Burdick breaking. Neither scored in the first shot but Hedge came up strong in the next few shots and up to the sixteenth shot kept within 10 points of his more experienced opponent.

Both played a remarkably cool and tight game and the result as herein stated bears this out. In all 50 shots were required to reach the required number of points. Hedge's score made an average of 2.5 and Burdick's 4.12.

Hedge has consented to a return game to be played at this popular place Monday evening, the same handicap to be played as the last. Burdick seems overly confident in his ability to defeat the Lents man.

After the main event Monday eve Wilcox, who recently won the championship of Portland, gave an exhibition of fancy shots that were truly and really marvelous. He played Hedge 50 points one-handed and won. He also equaled the high score of the evening, 19, with one hand. On another occasion he made a run of 14.
