But the temperature of this our country is such that I think it good for Englishmen not to be long fasting. Yet some may better bide without than t'others. Children and young men until they came to the age of thirty-five may not be long fasting without inconvenience. Men of middle age-that is, from thirty-five to forty-nine-may better beare it. Old men, being not decrepite-that is, from fifty to seventy-may best of all abide fasting, but after seventy years they are to be dieted as children."-London Chronicle.
