BOILER ACCIDENT KILLS 32

Southern Pacific Shops in San Antonio Wrecked by Explosion.

San Antonio, Tex.—At least 32 men were killed and parts of their bodies strewn for blocks when a big passenger locomotive in the Southern Pacific shops blew up here. Besides the 32 believed to have been killed, 59 persons were injured.

Twenty of the bodies have been identified, but what is believed to be 12 more is little more than a tangled mass of fragments of human flesh and bones that probably never will be separated.

It is believed the explosion was caused by carelessness of some one of the killed, in allowing cold water to flow into the hot boiler of the locomotive. The locomotive was nearly new and was in the shops for inspection. It was of the large Mogul type.

Train is Held up, Looted of \$60,000
 Corinth, Miss.—Mobile & Ohio passenger train No. 4, northbound, was held up and the express safe blown open and robbed seven miles south of Corinth by four men heavily armed and masked. It is reported the safe contained \$60,000 in currency.

Lawful Primaries Favored by Taft.
 Boston.—Before the Massachusetts legislature President Taft spoke on presidential primaries, pointing out that he favored such registration of the popular will in regard to the presidential candidates where the law safeguarded the ballot, but scored "soap box" primaries.

NEW MEXICO HAS BRIBERY SCANDAL

Albuquerque, N. M.—Four members of the New Mexico legislature were arrested at Santa Fe, charged with accepting bribes to vote for certain candidates for United States senator. Bribes amounting to \$500 each, are said to have been paid them.

The arrest of the legislators, all members of the house of representatives, was effected by means of a ruse, and came as a dramatic climax to dickerings extending for several days, it was said. After their arrest they wrote their resignations. The trap to catch the men was laid by Efezo Baca, of Albuquerque, one of the managers of Judge Albert B. Fall, one of the leading candidates for United States senator.

Death Roll Grows in Virginia Court
 Hillsville, Va.—One more death, that of Juror Augustus Fowler, has been added to the list of fatalities of the Allen raid on the Carroll county courthouse, making a revised total of five.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Postal savings banks will open April 12 at Beaverton and Newport.

Senator Chamberlain has introduced a bill increasing by \$19,000 the cost limit of the public building at Albany.

Joseph Peterson Taylor, aged 82, an Oregon pioneer, who settled in the Willamette valley in 1852, is dead at his home near Cottage Grove.

The Umatilla project is not only being rapidly developed as a fruit producing section, but vegetables also are to be planted this year on a large scale, especially potatoes.

The quality of the 1912 clip of Lake county will be far superior to that of any other crop for a number of years past. The winter has been mild and the sheep are in good condition.

A meeting of the apple growers of Linn and Benton counties was held at the Albany commercial club rooms, to discuss matters relative to the fruit of the two counties and its protection.

Contract for the construction of the Roseburg-Coos Bay railroad has been let and it is said actual work will begin within 10 days. The survey traverses some of the best farming and timber land in the state.

The Eugene school board has issued a call for a special election on April 6 to vote on a proposition to bond the district for not to exceed \$200,000 for the purchase of a site and the erection of a new high school building.

Attorney-General Crawford announced that he expects to file a petition for rehearing soon in the case of the Corvallis & Eastern road, which involves the tidelands along Alsea, Yaquina and Siletz bays in Lincoln county.

Death has claimed Qmaiquania, or Susan Fuller, as she was known among the whites. She was the last surviving female among the Siletz tribe of Indians, and was born where the Siletz agency is now located, about one hundred years ago.

A mortgage to secure \$6,000,000 in six per cent gold bonds, to run 15 years, is given to the Merchants Loan & Trust company of Chicago by the C. A. Smith Timber company, owning 379,999 acres of land in the Oregon counties of Coos, Curry, Douglas, Linn, Lincoln and Malheur.

With from 50 to 75 applications for registration coming in each day and 5280 registrations of motor vehicles already made since the first of the year, the record of the automobile department at the state capital promises to far eclipse its record of last year under the new motor vehicle law.

Again for February, the accidents in the paper mills in the state top the list in the report issued by State La-

bor Commissioner O. F. Hoff. There were 32 accidents in this industry during February. An equal number is reported in machine work, but all other industries report a lesser number.

Tom Brown, better known as "Indian Tom," died at his home near the Oregon state line. Tom was formerly an Indian scout and had played a prominent part in the Modoc Indian wars, and as near as can be ascertained by those who know him he was 95 years of age at the time of his death.

Pendleton's "Clean-Up Day" will be April 6. The council has authorized Mayor Matlock to appoint two councilmen to act in conjunction with a committee from the "Round Up" association to devise means of making the present Round Up park into the most beautiful possessed by any city of 5000 inhabitants.

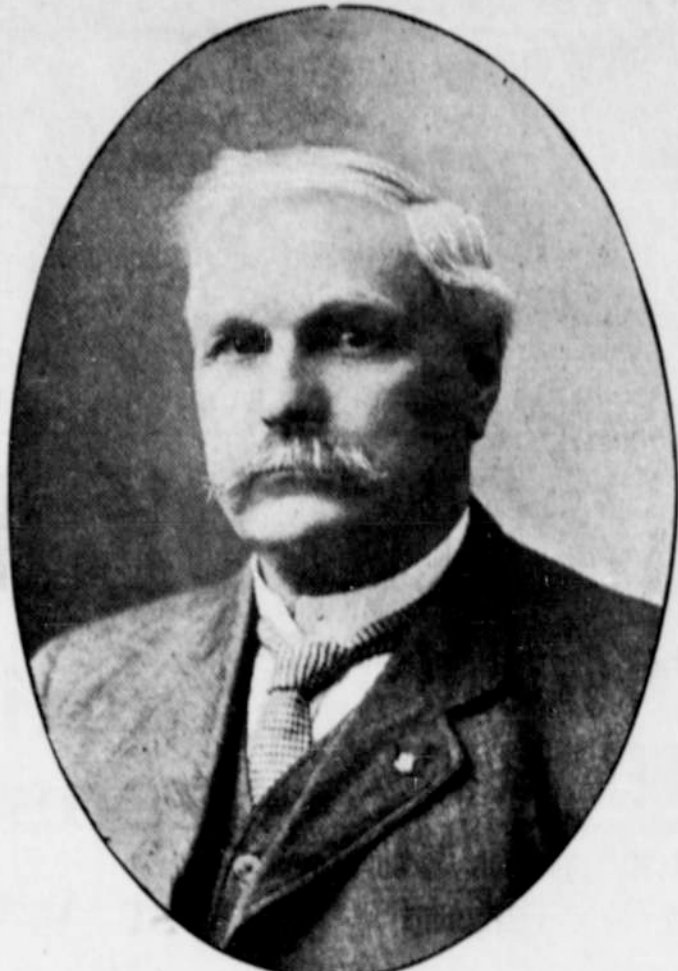
The back-to-the-farm movement started in all parts of Oregon, has received a strong impetus in Klamath county. The county high school board and the county court have employed F. L. Griffin, a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College, to teach agriculture in the high school and to take charge of the farming of the county infirmity farm.

Standing back of a project to reclaim arid lands and place them in the hands of settlers practically at the cost of placing the land under irrigation, the Ontario commercial club has started an innovation in the colonization work of Oregon which is in admirable harmony with the movement advocated by the Oregon Development League for "low-priced lands to the incoming colonist."

The mystery of the murder of Mrs. Elizabeth Griffith at her lonely home six miles from Philomath, on June 5, 1911, was cleared up by the arrest of George Humphrey, a 53 year old neighbor of Mrs. Griffith. Humphrey has made a full confession, stating that he strangled the aged woman to death with a piece of rope, threw her body into a lake, and robbed the house of a small amount of money.

One thousand letters to ministers of Oregon churches have been sent out from the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction, urging each to preach a sermon on the value of industrial work for the young people of the state. Superintendent Alderman asks that Sunday, March 31, be designated as the day when all pulpits of the state will have pastors preaching the industrial gospel to the youth of Oregon.
