SAYS GAMBLING IS GOING ON IN LENTS

It seems that our officers are very lax about the way liquor is dealt out in our midst, cigarettes used by minors, and various evils, and now gambling for money is growing apace. Something must be done. Who will do it?

We have our schools, expect to have our play grounds for the education and right training of our children, but we cannot fully succeed unless these evils are checked. When a father is out nightly or comes home influenced by drink it takes a very short time for a child to see and know something is amiss.

In connection with the above it is only necessary to state that if any person knows that gambling is openly permitted here and that other laws are being violated, all that is necessary to bring the perpetrators before the court is to file a complaint or information with the local Justice of the Peace. No doubt a warrant will be issued by the Justice if he is given direct evidence. Or inform the constable that this is the case, and then he cannot refuse to do his duty.

The Herald does not know that officers are willfully allowing these conditions to exist, but we do know that if any citizen has a plain knowledge that laws are being violated daily that it is his or her duty to inform the officials, and then see to it that the violators are arrested.
