> The number of known dead, however, was swelled Monday to a total of 34, when a tornado practically wiped out the village of Rogers, Okla.

It is known that 20 towns were struck by the storm which swept northward through portions of southwestern and central Oklahoma, and that two of them, Butler and Foss, College, a resolution was unanimously were literally wiped out.

It had been reported that 10 persons had been killed at Foss. Approximately 175 persons were injured, but not more than a score are seriously hurt. Seven persons were killed in the vicinity of Kirkland, Tex., and two at Foulke. A woman and her child probably were fatally hurt near Tallum. 
