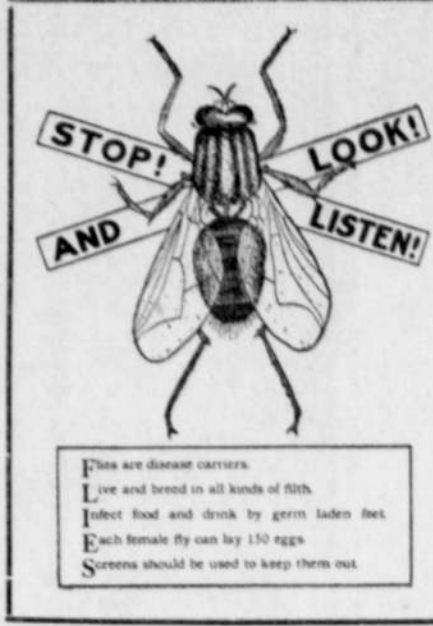
Lon Ward, who was recently confined to his home with an attack of grip, has suffered a relapse and is again indisposed.
