Lents' team of the A. W. League won another victory Sunday, when they administered another defeat to the Marshall Wells team on the local diamond by a score of 9 to 3. Again in the seventh two errors and two hits allowed three more runs. The other two runs secured by the locals came in the fourth and fifth frames, due to timely hitting.

The visitors scored one in the second as a result of a hit and error. In the third a hit and an error scored another, and the third score came in the seventh when Theron, Boone and Trumon hit safely.

Aside from the second inning the visitors played equally as good ball, as the locals. Pitching honors were about even between Boone of the visitors and Clark, for Lents. Each fanned eight men, the former allowing eight hits, and the latter six. Boone not only twirled a good game, but slammed out a three-bagger and a single and played an excellent field game. Had his support been one half as good the game would have been decidedly close. Clark not to be outdone by Boone, also drove out two singles.

Matt Boland, who played third for the locals, and Howe, who held the same position for the visitors, were the two bright stars of the game, the work of both being of a high order. Boland handled seven chances nicely and behaved in the big league style. Howe, perhaps played a more brilliant game, owing to the chances he received being more difficult to handle, and handled six chances with a single error in judgement.
