### CHERRYVILLE

Fall work mostly done. Good crop of potatoes in this vicinity. Henry Budaustein made a business trip to Portland last week. Work at the Hatchery is nearly over for the season as but little attention is paid to the silversides of which there has been an unusually heavy run. More than 2,000,000 eggs have been shipped from this hatchery this season and nearly as many young fry—all other Chinook or Steel Heads released. ## FIRE DESTROYS ANOTHER HOME

Saturday afternoon the residence belonging to Floyd Gill on Saginaw Heights was totally destroyed by fire and most of the contents. Mr. Gill is employed in the city and when the fire originated Mrs. Gill was at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Patton, whose residence is situated within 20 feet of the one destroyed. Neighbors first noticed the smoke, but the interior of the house was almost a solid mass of flames before being discovered. An alarm was sounded and the local fire department was at the scene within less than five minutes, but were unable to save the home and it was only by the hardest of work that they prevented the Patton home from burning. The burned residence was partially insured, but the contents were not and the loss is severely felt by Mr. and Mrs. Gill, who have been married only a short time.

Mr. Patton, owner of the residence that was barely saved, has been one of the most loyal supporters of the volunteer fire department and he feels that the work of the department saved his home and considers the money has been well spent.

## Vote for Millage Bill Number 320 X Yes

It provides six-tenths of a mill tax for support of Agricultural College and University of Oregon, giving them permanent support and taking them out of politics. It also provides one Board of Regents, thus solving the problems of re-organization, consolidation, division of sources and economy of management.

It does not increase the average rate of taxation.

It repeals the \$500,000 University appropriation bill.
