### Two Helpful Hints.

When wishing to keep vegetables—such as greens, lettuce, parsley, etc., until the following day, place, with the roots, or where they have been cut, in a vessel containing water, exactly as you would a bunch of cut flowers, and they will be as fresh as if newly cut.

### Relief for Crop-Bound Birds.

To relieve a crop-bound bird, fill a fountain syringe with warm water, insert the end of the hose without the nozzle into the bird's throat, and fill the crop with water. Then hold the bird's head down and gently press out the contents of the crop.

Sargent Gething, the Lents center, then carried the ball over for a touch down by the hidden ball trick which completely fooled the visitors as so scored for Lents in the third quarter when he broke through the Mohawk line and blocked a punt. In the fourth quarter neither side scored. Stevens, the Lents half, started throughout the game, often breaking up the Mohawk plays.

The school team defeated Clinton Kelly Wednesday, the 27th., by a score of 19 to 0. The game was an easy victory for Lents. Their goal was at no time in danger during the game. Steven started for Lents and was also the chief yard gainer.
