SEEDS THAT ARE DESIRABLE FOR SPRING PLANTINGS

At the suggestion of a Herald representative, Mr. Ray Gill, of Gill Bros. Seed Co., of Portland, has sent us a very fine list of seeds desirable for spring planting in this locality. The selection of these varieties is not based solely on the quality of the product. Mr. Gill addressed the Lents Grange last Saturday on the subject: "Preparation for Spring Planting," and besides discussing the preparation of the soil, which he considered constituted about half in the production of the crop, he made valuable suggestions on the selection to be planted. He pointed out that it is not sufficient merely to plant beans, but that there were certain varieties of beans that grow most satisfactorily in this locality as determined by soil and climatic conditions. The same is true of other varieties of vegetables. Our soil being of a light clayey texture, is not adapted to all kinds of garden plants.

Below is Mr. Gill's list:

ASPARAGUS—Palmetto.

BEANS—Green Pod Bush, Burpee's Stringless Green Pod, Wax Pod Pole, Challenge Black Wax, Green Pod Pole, Kentucky Wonder, Wax Pod Pole, Kentucky Wonder Wax, Lima Bean, Marshall's Pole Lima.

BEETS, TABLE—Early Model, Detroit Dark Red.

CABBAGE—For early sort, Early Jersey Wakefield; for summer, Glory of Enkhuisers; for early fall, Glory of Enkhuisers; for winter, Danish Ball Head.

CARROT, TABLE—Chautenay.

PEPPERS—Crimson Giant.

PUMPKIN—Winter Luxury Pie.

RADISH—Turnip Shaped, Early Scarlet Turnip White Tipped, Crimson Giant, Long White Pearl, White Icicle, Long Bright Scarlet White Tipped.

SPINACH—Victoria.

SALSIFY—Mammoth Sandwich Island.

SQUASH—Winter, Delicious; Summer, Strickler's Summer Crookneck.

TOMATO—First early, Earliana; Main Crop, Bonny Best.

What Salt Will Do.

A little rubbed on the cups will take off tea and coffee stains.

If soot drops on the carpet, cover it immediately with salt and it can all be swept up.

Salt added to the starch will prevent the clothes from getting musty.

Put into whitewash will make it stick better.

It will keep the teeth white, the gums hard and rosy.

A good gargle for sore throat. One teaspoon to a pint of water.

Salt and water will clean willow furniture. Apply with a small brush and wipe dry.

After having the hands in dish water, or when rough from housecleaning, wash them, rinse, and while wet rub thoroughly with table salt, rinse again and wipe dry. You will be surprised to see how smooth they will feel.

To keep clothes from freezing to toe line, put a handful of salt in the last rinsing water.

Salt put down the sink drain will keep it from freezing.
