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ONE of the most frequent causes of fires in country homes is the carelessness with which matches are handled. It has been our experience to have known of several fires due to children getting hold of matches, and trying them on paper, or other inflammable materials about the buildings. Matches are not only dangerous for their inflammability but they are poisonous and children frequently have sucked their heads off with the result that dangerous illness has resulted. Now comes a story from the east of a child that was tapping a lead pencil in a long brass cap. The cap exploded and tore two of the child's fingers off. This was a "right in time of school affair," and when the other pupils were questioned two other boys were found each with one of the same sort of caps in their mouths. A little crouching and off would go their heads. This is especially likely to occur in a country like this where so much powder is used in clearing land. Better keep your inflammables and explosives and poisons under lock and key. It is hard enough for people who understand the nature of these things to get along with them without expecting children to handle them with safety.

THE pitiable sight of a lot of doctors opposing any suggestion that offers a way out of the deplorable losses of life annually, due to the prevalence in disease and accidents, is again illustrated in the east where a German specialist, invited to this country for the purpose of demonstrating his cure for tuberculosis, was denied the privilege of testing his cure. And this principally because the American doctors do not care to have a foreigner invade their field of income. There ought to be a national board of examiners, where once a doctor got his certificate of proficiency, they could not be questioned in any state or section of the whole country. That would eliminate a certain amount of jealousy.
