THE new currency bill now recommended by the President and pushed in the Senate by Senator Simmons, and in the House by Representative Glass, is meeting with a good deal of opposition by the national bankers who threaten to throw up their charters and become state banks if it becomes a law. This is only bluffing as they never lose a snap like the national banking system as at present conducted. Under this system the bankers buy U. S. bonds and deposit them in Washington, draw interest on them free from taxation, and have issued to them currency for the face value of their bonds, which they bring home and loan to people at from eight, ten and twenty per cent. Besides this they juggle with public and private deposits without being required to give a guarantee as to the safety of these deposits. The bankers call this new law a Bryan Bill as they have no love for that great and shining statesman ever since he advocated the guarantee deposit law, which is already enforced in Oklahoma, Kansas and other states. How true it is as Mr. U'ren says, "that some men have grown rich not by labor but by law." Now that the government proposes to control its own currency the same as it does its bonds, the bankers are in a terrible sweat.

THE City ordinance to enforce the cutting of weeds might well be enforced in this part of town. There are several large areas in this section which are pretty well hidden by high weeds. Not only are they unsightly, but they will continue the pest and seed the whole neighborhood. Later in the season the dry grass and weeds will make a fine field for fire.
